La Jol I a 2006: Rough Water!

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It was a glorious Sunday in La Jolla Cove September 10, when more than 2,000 swimmers of all ages, including many Arizona Masters, competed in the 76th Annual La Jolla Rough Water Swim. Masters had their choice of one- or three-mile (Gatorman) courses in five-foot swells and strong currents. The sun was out and the Pacific was a mild 70.1 degrees according to the official race thermometer (no, not my toe.) A perfect race day!

545 Masters Men through the age of 83 finished the one-mile course. First place was taken easily by Mark Warkentin, 26 of Santa Barbara in a time of 17:38.6. (Due to space limitations, this article will report only those Arizona Masters who placed in the top five in their age groups.) Stephen So, 31, of Peoria came in a wave ahead of Kevin Zacher, 31, of Phoenix to earn fourth and fifth in times of 23:13 and 23:28.5 respectively for men's 30-34; Patrick Brundage, 39, of Scottsdale won his age group (and 12th overall) with 20:57 while Sam Perry, 37, snatched 5th; Tom Hickcox, 53, of Carefree, stroked to 2nd place (29th overall) with his 21:32.

388 Women competed in the one-mile, which was won by Amy Dantzler, 42, of Los Angeles in a time of 21:02. Tucsonan Celestena Duke, 29, earned 1st in her age group for the one mile with a time of 23:02; Heidi Sweet, 34, also of Tucson took bronze in her age group with 24:47; Louise Keough, 37, of Peoria, took 3rd with 24:08; Chris Fischer, 41, of Tucson took 5th with a 24:58 before finishing the Gatorman in 1:16.11 to earn 8th in her age group; in the 45-49 women's, Kristin Musch, 46 of Phoenix, earned 4th with 25:49; Evie Lynch, 54 of Scottsdale, finished with 26:25 for 4th; Sandy Baker, 56, of Tucson, won her age group with 26:35.

In Gatorman Men's division, Daily Double winner Mark Warkentin swam his way to gold in a time of :53:41, at least one hundred seconds ahead of open water veteran Alex Kostich and 264 other male competitors. Scottsdale swimmer Temujin Gold, 24, won 2nd in his age group with 1:01:19; Stephen Watt, 27, of Tempe, won 5th with 1:10:13; Eric Mix, 34 of Mesa won his age group with 59:54; Ed Hadley, 34, of Scottsdale finished 2nd with 1:04.48; Eric Dimmery pulled out a 4th with 1:07:19; Brad Cahoon, 51 of Scottsdale sealed his age group in 1:07:20.

A school of 102 Gatorman Women were led by U.S.A. swimmer Ellie Doran, 17, of Tucson who finished for gold in :59:40. Mesa swimmer Ellen Hickey, 46, won her age group in 1:13:22, while June Hussey, 45, of Tucson copped 3rd (1:14.06) and Karen Chequer-Pheiffer, 48, of Cave Creek followed on her heels for fourth (1:14.10).

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

FINA World Masters Omissions

In reporting on results of this meet in the last issue, I inadvertently omitted two stellar swims by Arizona Masters.

Patty Gray of Mesa placed 13th in Women's 55-59 age group during World Masters 3K Open Water Championships in Alameda on August 11, with a time of 1:01:35. Patty also successfully completed the swim from Alcatraz the next day sans wet suit. Way to go, Patty.

Jeff Commings set a World Record (Men's 30-34) in the 50m breast (29.01). He also won the 100m breast (tie) and the 100m back. Jeff writes for the AZ Daily Star and has been swimming with Ford Aquatics in Tucson for the past year. He had the opportunity to represent Team Tyr at Worlds so he did not swim under the AZ banner even though he is registered through AZ Masters.

Passing Lane



Masters Swimmer Mosel ey Covers 47.5 Mil es Through Canyonl ands National Park

MOAB, Utah, July 10. OVER the Fourth of July weekend, Matt Moseley of Boulder, Colo., swam from Potash Point below Moab to the confluence of the Green and Colorado Rivers. He completed 47.5 miles in a total time of 16:50 — 26 miles in 9:45 on the first day and 21 miles in 7:05 on the second day. I did it because I love being in the river," Moseley said. "This gave me the chance to really feel it and not just ride or float on it. It really gave me the chance to be a part of it. That is what I really took away from it. Actually being in the river that long is a really powerful feeling."

According to the National Park Service officials, who grant permits for Canyonlands National Park, they are not aware of anyone who has done such a swim. Moseley will swim in the 3K open water race at the FINA World Masters Swimming Championships at Stanford University and the Horsetooth 10K Open Water National Championships in Fort Collins, Colo., in August.
